The church at Whaddon was originally dedicated to St Margaret of Antioch, and is a small and simple traditional building dating largely from the 13th century.

Children from two local schools have been preparing for the Dedication 1315 weekend by learning about the traditional activities of the 14th century. Their 'medieval' paintings will adorn the walls of the church giving a strong visual impression of what the building might have looked like at the time of its dedication.

Whaddon 700 on Saturday 27 June, will include a procession with beasts, musicians, singers and dancers. You are invited to come along dressed as beasts or giants.

Everyone will have a chance to join in songs such as *Sumer is icumen in* that have endured for more than 700 years. Expect plenty of medieval fun!

St Mary the Virgin, Frampton on Severn

St Mary the Virgin, Frampton on Severn, has been muchextended since medieval times when its walls would have been covered in vibrant images. Local schoolchildren have now created new 'wall paintings', depicting stories from the bible, and also have learnt 14th century music.

Festivities in Frampton will start at the Churchwardens' Ale on Saturday 27 June with five hours of medieval fun for all the family. Turn the clock back and enjoy the dance, music, songs, mystery plays and games of 1315. Enter the hobby horse competition, (please bring yours suitably attired), practice medieval handwriting, eat, drink and be merry until the service of Compline with its traditional plainsong.

Dedication Day processions were an important part of the celebrations and traditionally included giants and beasts. Why not join our giant, St Blaise, as he 'dances' his way through the village on Sunday 28 June with Bishop Walter Maidstone of Worcester (who dedicated our churches), Merry the horse and Siglo the salmon.*

The medieval church of St Mary the Virgin, Fretherne, was demolished in 1846 to make way for the present church which was built in the Late Decorated style, reminiscent of Gothic designs of c1290-1350.

Local artists will be displaying painted banners with the theme of 'parables of our own time'.

St John the Baptist, Harescombe

Harescombe has very narrow lanes. Please park as directed by local signage.



The bellcote at St John the Baptist, Harescombe, contains the oldest bell in Gloucestershire and is thought to date to the 13^{th} century. The church is open daily.

Take an historic tour around the building, learning about the connections between its features and the local community.

A display of images of consecration crosses on the interior walls remind us that these were placed where a bishop had anointed a church with chrism or holy water in order to consecrate it.

A new altar frontal, made by ladies from the local community, will be dedicated by the Bishop of Tewkesbury during the service on Sunday 28 June.

DEDCATON: 1315:

A total of 43 churches and/or their altars were consecrated by Bishop Maidstone of Worcester in 1315. Heritage Lottery funding has enabled us to research the background to these events and provide details of how to celebrate them authentically.
